

Water Science, Regulation/Law and Policy Field School June 14th & 15th, 2007

The Watershed Research and Education Program at Northern Arizona University is pleased to announce a two-day Field School on June 14th and 15th, 2007. Our intention is to provide decision makers a high-quality field and conference-room seminar that includes water science, law and policy that we anticipate will assist in your future decision-making. We plan to explore and identify solutions to water issues in north-central Arizona such as water supply, storm water and flooding, and wastewater issues. The Field School is being organized for elected municipal officials, tribal councils and county supervisors however, we welcome all individuals who are interested in water management.

During the first day of the Field School, authorities from across the state will provide concise and up-to-date informational overviews of hydrologic science, water law, and water policy as they apply to current and emerging issues that face Arizona communities. During the second day, experts in water supply, storm water and flooding, and wastewater will discuss on-theground implementation of solutions to these issues at sites close to Flagstaff.

Our focus is on issues in north-central Arizona watersheds, however to help us provide a more beneficial experience for you we ask that you send topic suggestions that are important to your region, city or tribe. A box for suggestions or comments is located on the back of the enclosed registration form.

Registration is \$300 and includes the cost of the event, continental breakfasts and lunches on the 14th and 15th, and dinner at the Historic Colton House on the 14th. Registrants for the Field School are responsible for their own lodging. You may wish to secure lodging at the conference hotel, which is Little America (800-435-2491). The Field School registration deadline has been extended to June 11, 2007.
